

As an Educator, there are a few steps to joining and getting started with RaiseMe.

1 Create a Free Account at www.raise.me

Creating an Educator account on RaiseMe is quick and free! We have three types of accounts, if you work at a school offering 9-12 grade sign up for a *Teacher* or *Counselor* account at your school. If you work with high school students outside of a school or through an access organization, sign up for a *Mentor* account.

To protect student privacy, we will verify your email and employment at your org or school.

2 Invite Students

Once you've created an account, you can immediately begin inviting your students to join RaiseMe. There are a ton of ways educators can and have shared RaiseMe with their students:

- Share your custom link with students in class, on Remind, on Naviance, on your website, on a billboard (:)), or whatever system you use to communicate with students
- Email invitations to your individual students
- Import students through Google Classroom
- Tell students in-class with our pre-built lessons
- Send our pre-written letter home to parents

As students create their accounts and Connect with you, you'll be able to follow their progress in high school, learn about the colleges they're interested in, and view their micro-scholarship earnings on RaiseMe.
